Color and the Church Year

God has blessed our world with a variety of color. We all have our favorite colors. We prefer color that looks good on us. Color is used to identify our team, or country, or brand. Color speaks to our mood.

Color has also been used in the church to help communicate important lessons. During our past Holy week colored cloth was draped on the cross to help remind us of the meaning of the season. Thank you to those who suggested the enhancement.

There is an interest in using color to drape the cross during special times of the year. Why and what do these colors mean? For centuries, Christian Churches have used color to communicate the seasons of the church calendar, sometimes called the Liturgical Year (meaning: having to do with public worship).

Within each of those seasons, there are special worship services that help us name and celebrate our participation in the Christian story today.

Advent : Originally begun as a time of preparation for the coming of Christ, Advent is a time of expectancy and anticipation in which we "prepare the way of the Lord." In the ninth century, Advent was established as being the four Sundays before Christmas counted down by lighting the candles of an Advent wreath.



Our worship services throughout Advent focus on the four themes of Advent: hope, peace, joy, and love. The color for Advent is purple, signifying "royalty" and the reign of Christ on earth. Christmas : Christmas, the celebration of the birth of Christ, is one of the high-water marks of the liturgical calendar. With great joy, we remember that God has come to be part of our world and part of our lives.

Advent at First Baptist culminates in our Christmas Eve service. While the structure of this service may vary from year-to-year, the traditions of telling the story of Jesus' birth, singing carols, and lighting a candle to signify our witness that the light of the world has come. The color for Christmas is white, signifying purity, joy, and light.

Epiphany : The Christmas season concludes with Epiphany, a word meaning "manifestation" or "showing forth." It commemorates the visit of the Magi to the Christ child. Continued from page 1... Color and the Church Year

The Magi understood that Jesus was "God with us;" it is the mystery and the miracle of Epiphany that these wise ones knew enough to fall down and worship Jesus. Epiphany Sunday is observed on the Sunday closest to Epiphany, January 6. The final Sunday after Epiphany recounts the Transfiguration of Christ. The color for Epiphany is white, signifying joy and light.

Lent : Lent is part of the Easter cycle which begins forty days before Easter (excluding Sundays). Lent is a time to rest, to meditate, to pray, and to gather spiritual strength in preparation for the celebration of Easter. The color for Lent is purple, signifying mourning and repentance.

Ash Wednesday : Ash Wednesday begins the Season of Lent. In many churches Ash Wednesday service is a reflective service including the imposition of ashes on the forehead. The wearing of ashes signifies sorrow (for our sinfulness) and repentance (a desire to turn away from self and toward God).

Palm Sunday : Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, the celebration of Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem. Worship on this day enacts this event and foretells the coming week in the life of Christ. Our children process into the sanctuary waving palm fronds in anticipation of the coming of Christ's kingdom.

Maundy Thursday : "Maundy" is derived from the Latin word meaning "commandment" and recalls Jesus' words to his disciples just before his arrest: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." Our Maundy Thursday service relives Jesus' last evening through meditative scripture and song, and worshippers are invited to participate in Holy Communion. **Good Friday** : On Good Friday, the most solemn date on the Christian calendar, we remember the Crucifixion of Christ. The color for Good Friday is black, signifying death and mourning.

Easter : This day of celebration is marked with joy and festive expressions in the exclamation of Christ's resurrection. The Easter service of worship at First Baptist focuses on Christ's defeat of death and his living presence in our world. "He is Risen! He is risen indeed!" We pronounce our faith, "Because He lives, I can face tomorrow!" The color for Easter is white.

Pentecost : Fifty days after Easter, Pentecost celebrates the birth of the church and empowering of the Holy Spirit. A vibrant service of worship celebrates the power of the Holy Spirit, who is at work in the Church and in the world. The color for Pentecost is red, signifying the joy and fire of the Holy Spirit.


Ordinary Time : The Sundays after Pentecost comprise the liturgical year's longest period, which lasts until Advent. While the other liturgical seasons relive the life of Christ, this season focuses on the ongoing work of the church. The color for Ordinary time is green, the color of growth, reminding the church that we are given the charge to make disciples who follow Christ in the Kingdom of God.

As we move through the Church Year, may color remind us of the miracle of Jesus' love.



Series: Who Are Those Pictures on the Wall? (part 1)

REV. JOHN S. BRINKMAN

It seems good as FBC Hamilton begins our official 178th year, that we might consider the pastors of the past 100 years. We begin with the Rev. Dr. John S. Brinkman, pastor Sept. 30, 1928 – Aug. 16, 1949.

John S. (Silas) Brinkman was born Aug 26, 1892 in Lincoln, Lancaster County, Nebraska. He married Ila, they had 3 sons, 2 daughters. He was a veteran.

Rev. Brinkman descends from an ancestral line of ministers, his father having been a lay-pastor in Lincoln, Nebraska and his grandfather an ordained Lutheran minister in Sweden. He and Mrs. Brinkman were graduates of the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago, and he attended seminary.

Rev. John S. Brinkman accepted a unanimous call and came from Pontiac, Illinois to begin his ministry on September 30, 1928. He was interested, not only in shepherding his people, but also in many worthwhile community projects. For many years he was a member of the Board of Trustees of the Fort Hamilton Hospital, Booker T. Washington Center, and Salvation Army Advisory Board. He also served for years on the Ohio Baptist Board of Managers and was elected President of the Ohio Baptist State Convention for two successive years.

Dr. Brinkman's pastorate became the longest the church had ever known (at that time). This became possible because of his versatility as a Bible teaching preacher, a skilled administrator, with deep warmhearted love for people. That love was greatly reciprocated by the large and growing congregation. Mrs. Brinkman was a happy and fruitful co-laborer with her husband as she shared in numerous positions of leadership and teaching.



On Sunday August 14, 1949, Dr. Brinkman preached both morning and evening. He entered the Fort Hamilton Hospital as a patient on Monday and spent part of the evening visiting among other patients whom he knew. Tuesday morning, he underwent surgery and Tuesday night the city was shocked with the special news bulletin that his earthly ministry had been completed. The deep grief of the church was shared by people in every walk of life throughout the city where his fidelity to Jesus Christ, and the church, and his tender concern for all mankind had made indelible impressions as in the likeness of His Lord as he went about doing good. During his pastorate he received 1,651 new members into the church, 1,075 of which came by baptism.
